17th honten festival at miyoshi shrine, akita city
dozens of Bonten, symbol of the creative god, are carried by young men, who are to be the first to reach the shrine.

3rd himamatsuri or doll festival in all japan
in this festival for girls, a set of hina dolls and small household articles are arranged on a tier of shelves, covered with bright red cloth. these hina dolls consist of the emperer and empress in ancient costumes.

sagicho festival of himura (mid-march) shrine, omihachiman, shiga pref
gaily decorated floats are carried along the streets, on the last day of the festival, these floats are burned in the shrine.

mid-late fire festival of mt. aso, nar. kumamoto
this festival features hifuri shiriji or fire torch swinging, noyaki of grassfire and takigi noh or torch light performance.

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14th takayama matsuri of hic shrine, takayama
this festival, said to date back to the 15th century, is noted for a gala procession of gorgeous floats.

16th & 17th yayoi matsuri of funam-san shrine, nikko, tochigi pref.
the festival is featured by a parade of gaily decorated floats.

29th greenery day (national holiday)
this day was the birthday of the late emperor showa upon his death in January 1989, it was renamed greenery day.

3rd & 4th hakata domaku in fukuoka, fukuoka pref.
citizens in fancy disguise parade through the streets, masquerading as legendary gods on horseback to the accompaniment of shamisen, flutes and drums.

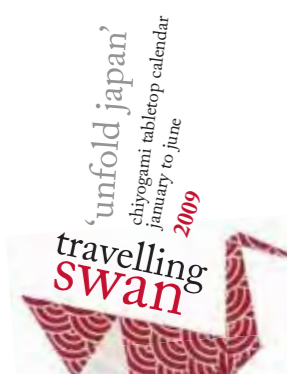
11th & 12th nakigi noh performance, nara

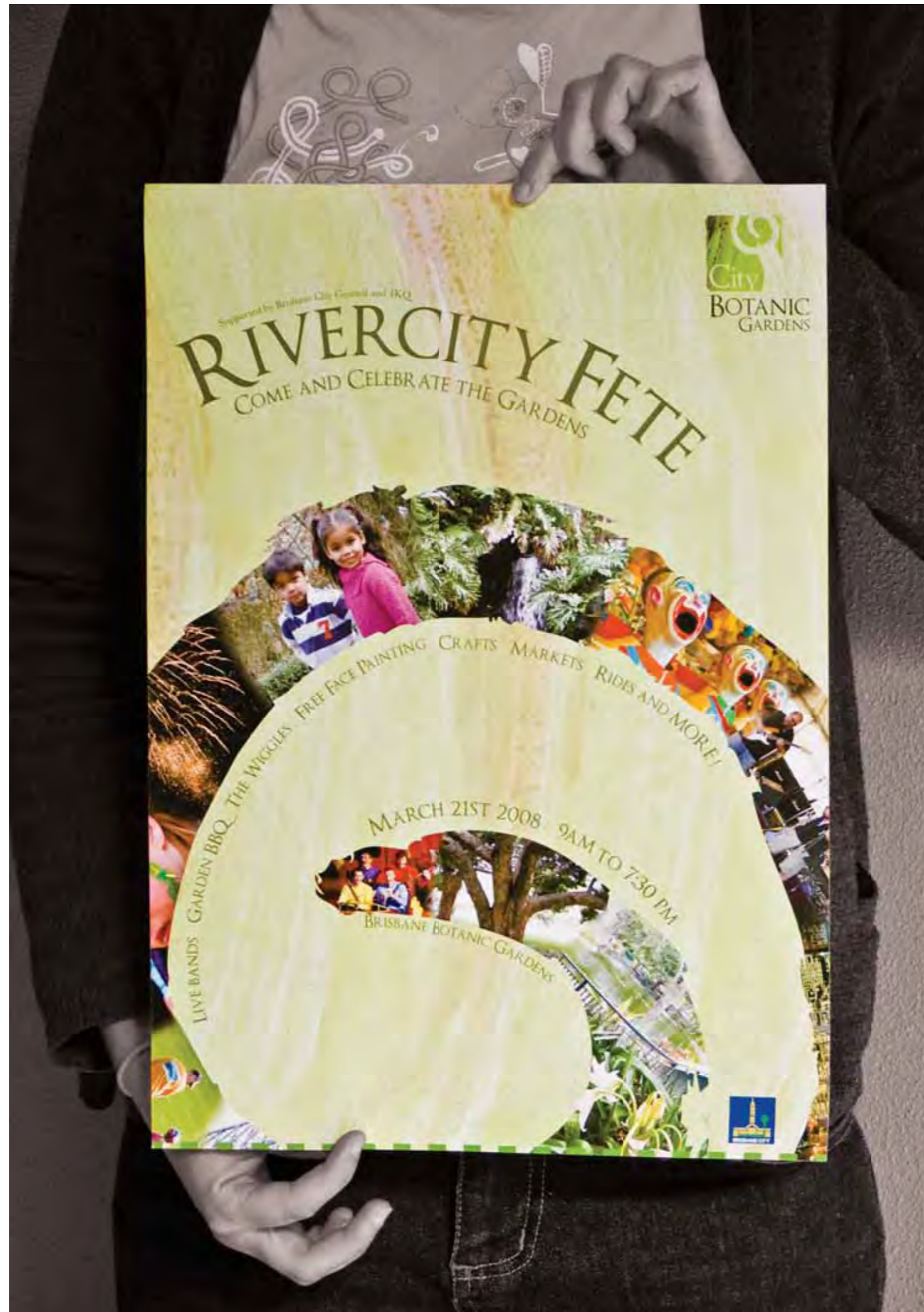

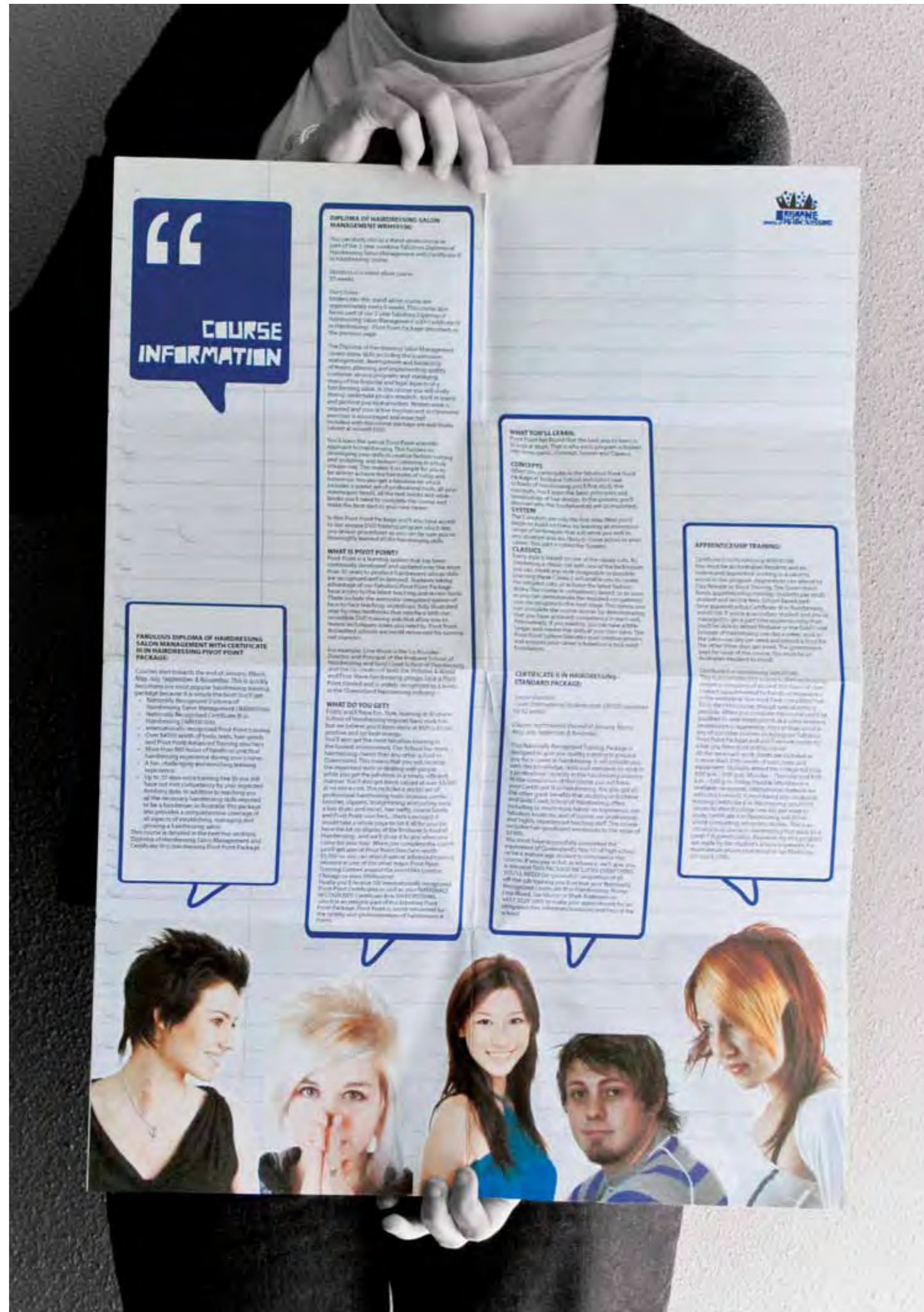

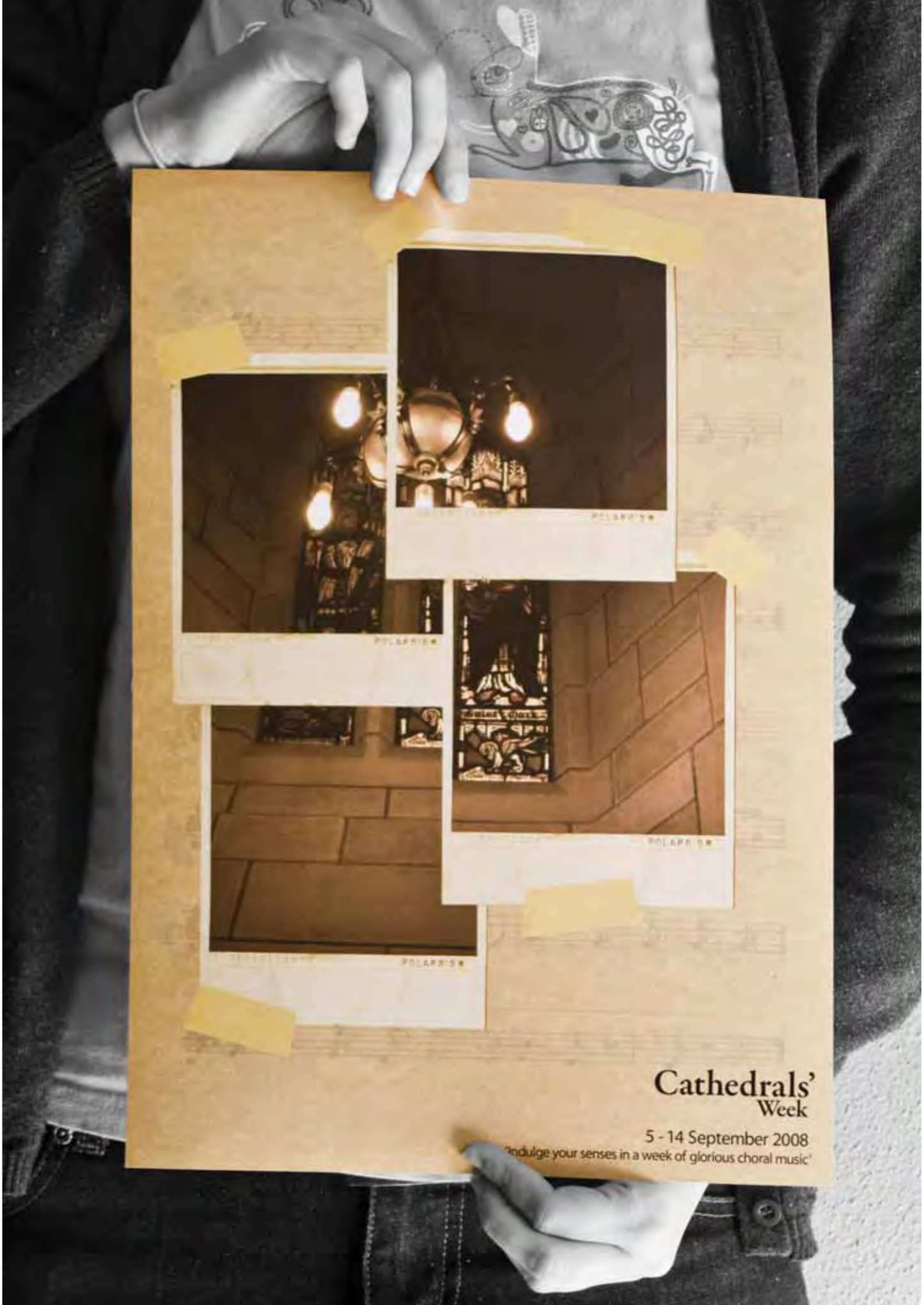

This recipe is good for a chocolate hit. It's basically the same as the Vanilla cupcake recipe, except you add cocoa powder and choc bits, and reduce the amount of flour by half of a cup.


Makes 24

1 1/2 cups self-raising flour, sifted
 3/4 cup caster sugar
 3/4 cup milk
 125g butter, melted, cooled
 2 eggs, beaten
 1 teaspoon Vanilla Essence
 1/2 cup cocoa powder, sifted
 3/4 cup dark or milk choc bits

Preheat oven to 200 degrees. Grease a 12 x 1/3-cup capacity muffin pan. Alternatively, line holes with paper cases. Combine flour, cocoa powder and caster sugar in a bowl. Make a well in the centre.

Add milk, butter, eggs and vanilla to flour mixture. Using a large metal spoon, stir gently to combine. Add choc bits.

Spoon mixture into prepared muffin pan. Bake for 12 to 15 minutes, or until a skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean. Stand in pan for 5 minutes before transferring to a wire rack to cool.

The plan for a gathering of The Torch Project's communities has been in germination for almost three years. In 2006, the vision became clearer with the forming of a Melbourne based Advisory Committee comprising representatives from the CCD sector, education and conference and event management to develop a logistical framework for the project, and a return visit to each of the Re-igniting Community towns throughout Victoria.

In each of the wide communities, the Torch Project team reconnected with key Indigenous and non-Indigenous community leaders, and in meeting them formed the statewide Re-igniting Community Victoria (RICVIC).

The primary objectives for the RICVIC roadtrip was to assess impact of Re-igniting Community project in each community and to gauge the response to a statewide gathering of communities in 2007/2008.

The response to the trip was overwhelmingly very positive. A number of critical were highlighted in each of the communities. These included: racism and cultural identity, lack of community capacity and leadership, family violence and alcohol and other drugs. Whilst there were varying levels of capacity in each community, all were committed to re-activating their local Steering Committees from previous projects. There are many steps along the way to gathering the communities together. This reconnection was the first.

Indigenous and non-Indigenous representatives each of the thirteen communities were invited to the first RICVIC Steering Committee meeting. Delegates discussed key issues, and journeys they had travelled since The Torch Project been in the community. Each community represented fed into the next stage of the development for the return of The Torch Project, for the development of the arts activity in the lead up to the RICVIC.

By 2007 RIC projects will have been conducted in thirteen geographic areas (eleven in regional Victoria) and collaborated with thousands of community members in workshops, consultations, exhibitions, event performances.

Through 2007 to 2009 The Torch Project will return to these communities in a state-wide project. Indigenous and non-Indigenous representation from each of the communities on the RICVIC Steering Committee has helped to shape the form and focus of the project.

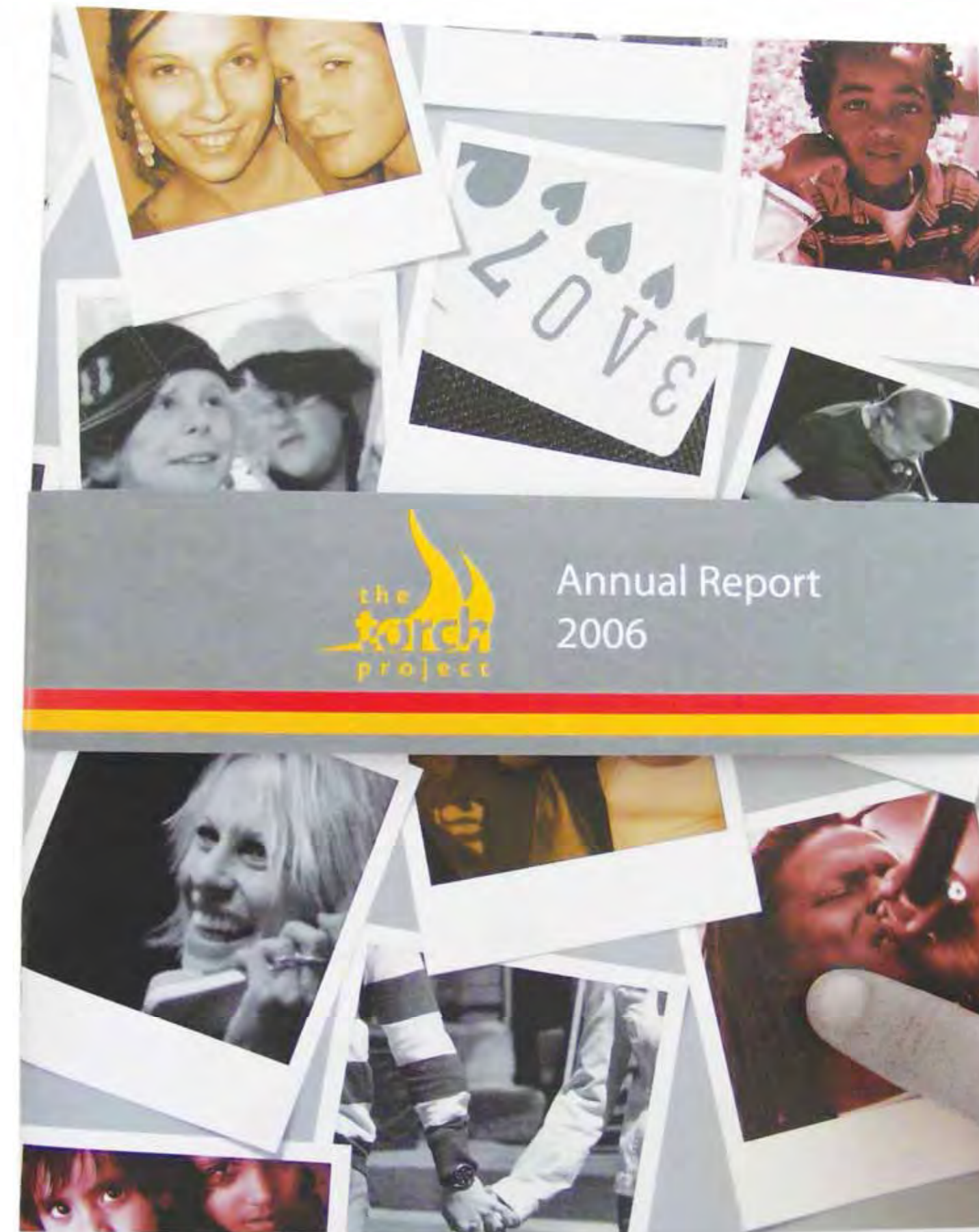
The Torch Project will work in the state-wide steering committee and each of the local committees, contracted artists and local artists to produce a series of arts workshops in each nine regional, two outer metro and two metropolitan communities. The project will promote local arts and culture, leadership, project planning and implementation, and sustainability of outcomes.

In 2008/09 each of the communities will join together at the RICVIC festival/ congress, seven day event to present the artwork created in the workshop series and to engage in workshops and forums to discuss approaches to tackling community issues. The festival will encourage participation from the local government, education, welfare, employment, health, Indigenous and community cultural development fields.

The Torch Project is currently developing cross-sectoral partnerships to ensure a wide base for support for the project.
